Reconciliation counseling usually involves a child who is refusing to have contact with their estranged parent.

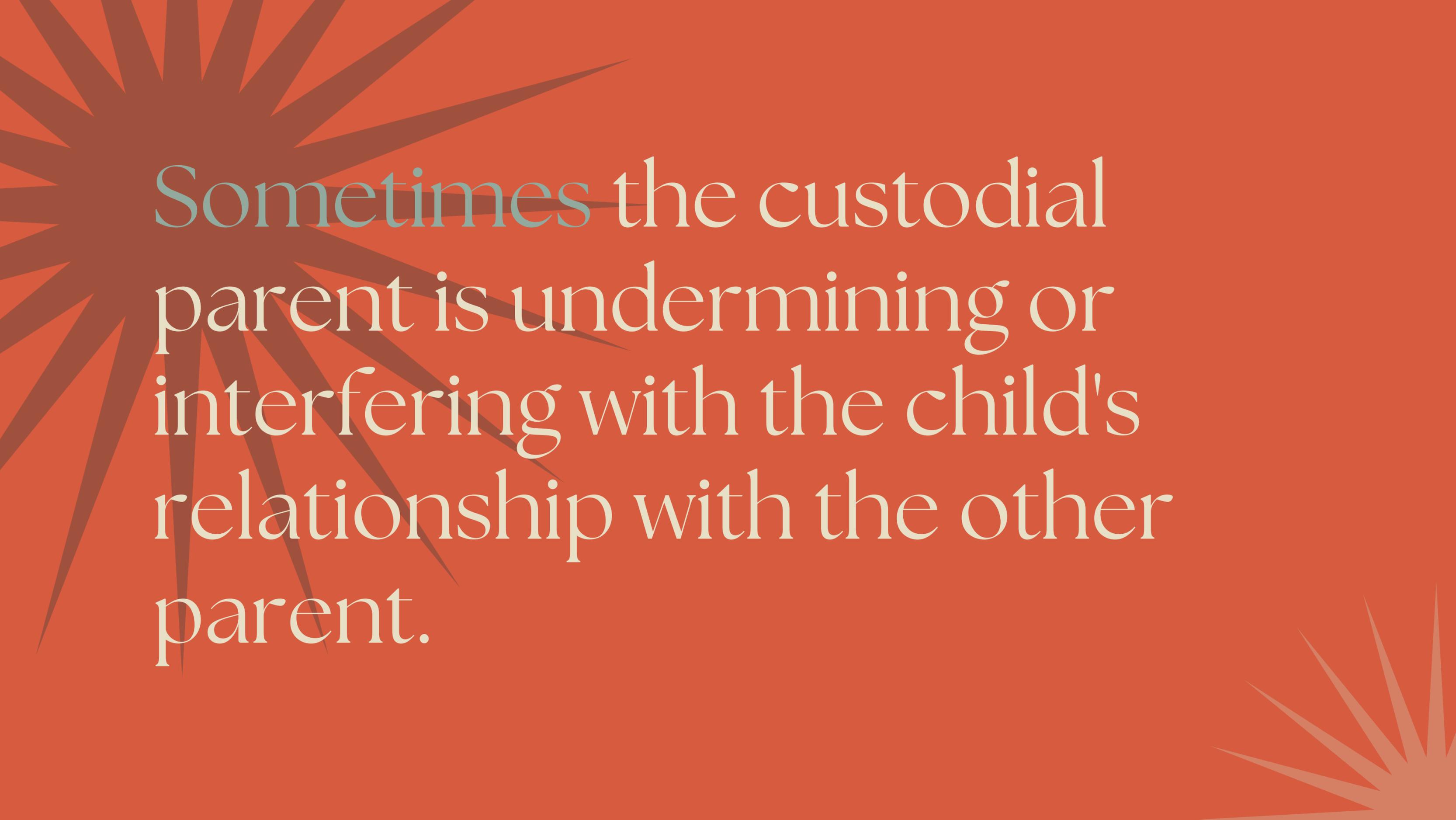


Many different factors play a  
role in the parent's  
estrangement from the child.



The older the child and the longer they've been estranged from the parent,

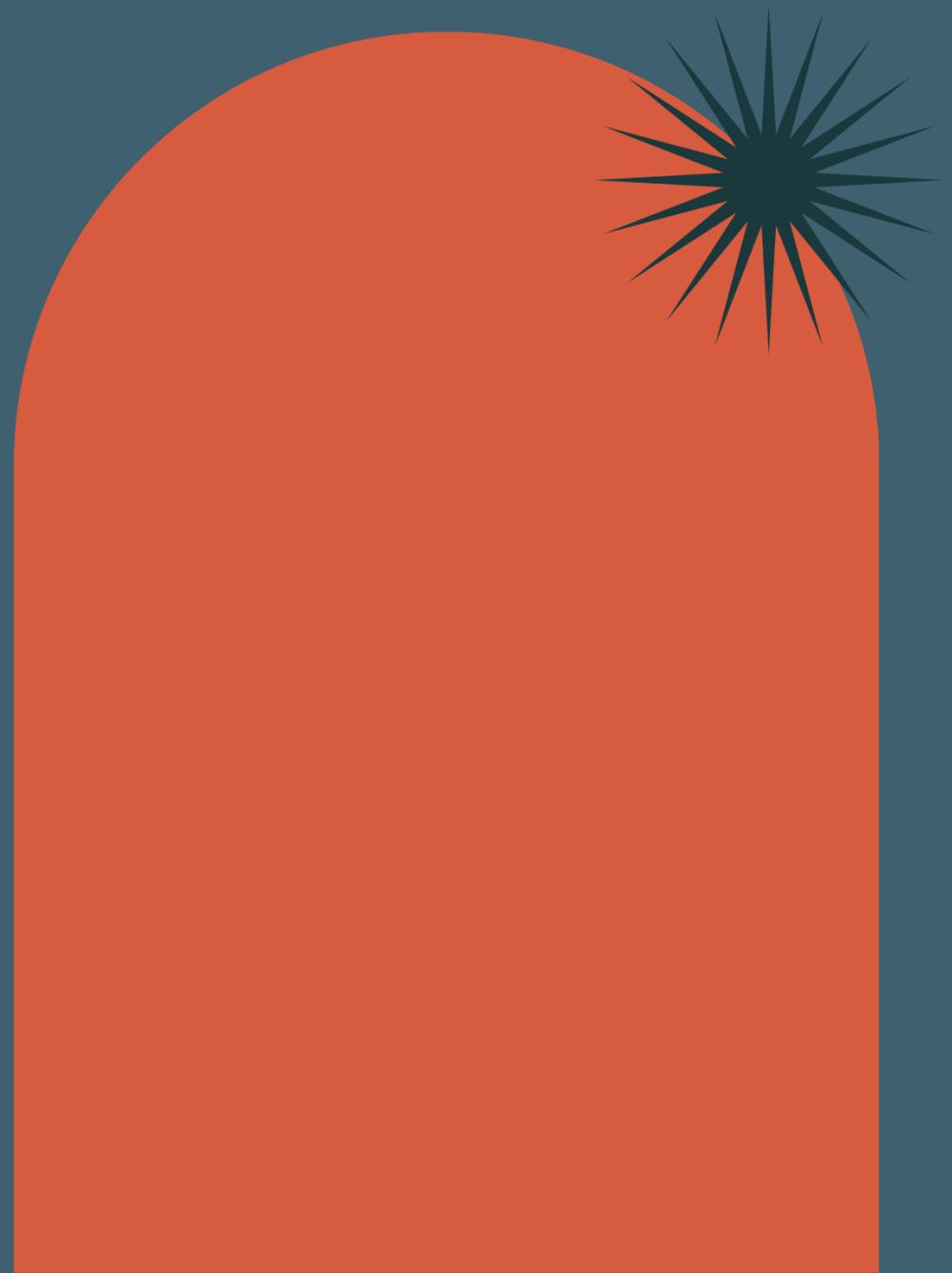
the more difficult and time consuming the reconciliation process will be.



Sometimes the custodial parent is undermining or interfering with the child's relationship with the other parent.

The estrangement may only be a few weeks or as long as several years. This process lets the child voice their concerns regarding the parent's absence.





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
